AppalReD Hosts Pro Bono Recognition Luncheons

AppalReD recently celebrated the generosity and hard work of its pro bono attorneys at two October luncheons, one at the Center for Rural Development in Somerset on October 10th, and the other at the Wilkinson Stumbo Convention Center in Prestonsburg on October 12th.

These events, aligned with National Pro Bono Recognition Week and in concert with events held by Kentucky's three other civil legal aid programs, also recognized the efforts of two members of Kentucky's Supreme Court in supporting civil legal aid. These Special Recognition awards were given to Justice Daniel Venters in Somerset, and to Justice Samuel Wright III in Prestonsburg.

Glenda Harrison, Executive Director of the Kentucky Access to Justice Commission, spoke of the recent history of the Commission and its work with the Kentucky Supreme Court to foster increased access to the legal system for lowincome individuals and families.

At the luncheon, AppalReD presented Certificates of Recognition to all volunteer attorneys who had represented AppalReD clients during 2017 and 2018, as well as "Nick of Time" awards to all who have represented former clients of Eric C. Conn in the recent disability fraud scheme. Distinguished Service Awards, given for an "above and beyond" level of volunteer service, were presented to Marsha Taylor and Jill Haste in Somerset and to Katherine Adams in Prestonsburg.

The venues and food for both locations were great, and VLAK appreciates all the effort that went into making these events successful!

Pro Se

VLAK conducted six pro se clinics for uncontested divorce clients during 2018: in Prestonsburg (twice), Hazard, Barbourville, Somerset and Richmond, serving a total of 93 clients throughout the year. Although we are continually "tweaking" the process to make it smoother, we have found these clinics to be very successful in meeting the needs of our clients and reducing stress on the court system. Although AppalReD also offers "pro se divorce packets" on our website and through the mail, both with an extensive set of instructions, the feedback we receive from clients and from the Circuit clerks is that pro se filings seem to be far more accurate and problem-free when completed during a clinic. The vast majority of clinic clients have been successful in obtaining a decree of dissolution as a result of the clinic.

Many of our clinics have had the benefit of participation by law students spending their spring or fall breaks with AppalRed. During 2018, law students from the University of Notre Dame and the University of California at Berkley assisted with clinics in Hazard and Prestonsburg. Clinics in Richmond, Somerset and Barbourville were assisted by summer law clerks from a variety of law schools. All students are supervised by a Kentucky-licensed attorney (usually the Pro Bono Director) who provides training in family law prior to the clinic. Feedback from the students has been generally very positive, as these clinics provide an opportunity for hands-on legal experience, as well as a chance for personal interaction with individuals experiencing the challenges of life in Appalachia. Law students this year have also had the opportunity to present information about Powers of Attorney in Kentucky to two senior citizen centers in our service area, and to travel to the Mud Creek Clinic to speak with Eula Hall, a pioneer in providing medical and social services in eastern Kentucky.

We continue to develop and improve pro se materials for the AppalReD website and welcome suggestions for appropriate forms and information. We also welcome the participation of our volunteer attorneys, especially in our pro se clinics, which could benefit greatly from the expertise of these attorneys and offer an option for less time-intensive service to our clients.

Attorneys and Law Students Needed!

VLAK is in need of attorneys throughout our service region to accept pro bono and reduced-fee civil cases for direct representation, as well as to assist with pro se clinics (where law students are also welcome and needed!) at sites throughout the region. Extended Representation

VLAK attorneys continue to provide extended representation to those whose cases, due to the large number of applicants for AppalReD's services, cannot be absorbed by AppalReD staff attorneys. As of this writing, VLAK's pro bono and "low bono" (contract) attorneys are currently working on a total of 136 extended service cases throughout our 37-county service area, primarily in the areas of divorce, custody, and bankruptcy. We are in the process of actively recruiting volunteer attorneys, both experienced and newly licensed, throughout the region. We are exploring a variety of training and mentoring opportunities, and hope to expand our service availability, particularly in our more rural counties.
